I am proud of and grateful for, their efforts on the field and off to represent their country and the Federation, often in challenging circumstances and against opponents many times their size. Whilst bruises, photographs and memories gathered on the field and in the field will fade, our players will always carry with them the lessons they learned through playing rugby: respect, perseverance, solidarity, self-discipline, healthy living and friendship.

None of this would be possible without the support, hard work and dedication of our stakeholders and partners. Our Federation is grateful for your generous, ongoing support and commitment to providing children, youth and adults with the opportunity to play rugby. Year in Review

Building on momentum generated in 2011, when the LRF conducted an ambitious set of outreach activities surrounding the Rugby World Cup and when the LRF welcomed VIP guests from across Asia and the world, including IRB Chairman Bernard Lapasset, to the Asian Women's 15s Division II Tournament and ARFU Annual General Meeting, the LRF team kicked off the year with the largest Vientiane 10s tournament to date. 13 teams from Laos and Thailand battled over two days, with the EDF Vientiane Wild Hogs capturing the Plate Championship, the highest ever finish for a Lao team in this competition.

Shortly thereafter, a squad of elite players was chosen to train with visiting Japan Rugby Football Union coach Katsuhiro Matsuo for the HSBC Thailand 7s in Bangkok. Matsuo's coaching style and the Lao squad's speed and skill were a good match, as the team captured the Bowl Championship with victories over Pakistan and the Philippines, in addition to experience-building matches versus Asian powerhouses Hong Kong and Japan.

In March, training began for a newly-formed men's touring side, the Lao Nagas. With the support of longtime community rugby sponsor Silver Heritage, this representative squad including new and experienced players from the Wild Hogs and Buffalos, was able to compete and take home the Bowl Championship in the Kowloon 10s RugbyFest, as well as take in the Hong Kong Sevens, the world's premiere Rugby Sevens event. The experience of watching rugby at that level and of being in a city electrified by rugby inspired the Nagas to continue their work to develop the sport at home upon their return. The Nagas made a splash in Hong Kong, generating a feature story in the South China Morning Post, and their story was shared with audiences across Laos and Hong Kong with the release of the "Adventures of the Lao Nagas", a documentary film by Lao New Wave Cinema founder Xaisongkham Induangchanthy.

In June, the Lao Women's National Team traveled to Manila, Philippines to compete in the Asian Women's 15s Division II Championship. Although they did not bring home a trophy, the experience of playing 15s test matches versus Singapore and the Philippines was invaluable, motivating young players to further develop their skills and build team spirit in the coming year. These lessons learnt contributed to hard, productive training sessions and several victories for the Lady Nagas at the Bangkok 7s competition in October, where they placed their best in Asian competition in two years. The LRF is proud to be one of only 8 ARFU member unions who has fielded a national 15s women's side.

The Lao Men's National Team, led by former Australian National Team player and coach Shirley Russell, headed to Phnom Penh in July to take on longtime rivals Cambodia and Brunei in the HSBC Asian 5 Nations Division 5 competition. Laos was unstoppable in the competition, outscoring Cambodia and Brunei by 128-14. The team captured the trophy for the fourth year in a row to the cheers of a large crowd of Lao students based in Phnom Penh as well as the Lao Ambassador to Cambodia. These victories earned Laos promotion to Division 4 of the HSBC Asian 5 Nations in 2013, where they will take on Lebanon, Uzbekistan and Pakistan. With these victories, Russell became the first woman in the history of the International Rugby Board to coach a men's national team in test matches.



In July, the LRF launched a groundbreaking sport-for-development project in partnership with ChildFund Laos, which uses rugby as a tool to deliver healthy living messages and life skills to children and youth in Lao, H'mong and Khmu communities across ChildFund's 12 partner villages in Nonghet District, one of 47 Government-designated 'poorest districts'. The LRF supported Sport Matters, an Australian NGO, to train a cadre of 50 male and female youth leaders to deliver sport and play opportunities, including rugby, to children in their villages. The LRF has conducted and will continue to conduct monthly outreach activities in Nonghet through June 2014, led by two youth leaders from Nonghet who have joined the LRF as interns for the year. Whilst in Vientiane, they will play on club teams, coach rugby in Champa Ban and receive training and development opportunities including coach training, English language lessons and IT training.

In November, men's and women's club teams from Vientiane, including the EDF Wild Hogs, Vientiane Buffalos and Vientiane Lions, traveled to Khon Kaen to participate in the annual regional Khon Kaen 10s tournament. The women were able to topple some tough regional rivals over the weekend, while the Buffalos made a strong showing and the EDF Wild Hogs took home the Cup Championship for the second year in a row.

2012 saw great progress in the development of the game domestically, as the Vientiane Wild Hogs and Vientiane Buffalos recruited new players and brought players out of retirement to form new teams to compete in the Lao Colours Cup, a four-team, domestic 15s competition. The LRF supported clubs to organize a series of development matches from August to December, which included junior players and participants from the LRF's development project at the Somsanga National Drug Rehabilitation Centre. The LRF will work together with clubs in 2013 to continue the development of the Colours League, whilst initiating a four-team, domestic 10s competition for women and taking the LRF closer to its ultimate goal of full membership of the International Rugby Board.

Champa Ban, the LRF's school and community rugby initiative continued to grow in 2012, with hundreds of children from 20 schools and community groups in Vientiane Capital and Xieng Khouang reaping the benefits of participation in sport. Champa Ban continues to use rugby as a platform to teach healthy living and life skills, including teamwork, leadership and communication. This year, over 360 sessions were held with over 9300 attendances and marked improvement in coaching quality from LRF development officers, many of whom graduated from Champa Ban themselves.

A key goal of Champa Ban, and a major pillar of the LRF's work, is promoting leadership and development amongst its players, coaches and staff. Many national team athletes participate in Champa Ban as coaches, officials and mentors for youth players who then go on to join club teams. In 2012, many of these veteran players participated in an IRB Level 1 Coaching Course and an IRB Level 1 Match Official Course, as well as receiving Sport for Development training.

Finally, the LRF made great strides in 2012 communicating to the public about its work through creative videos and media messaging, which brought in over 35,000 views on youtube, 500 new 'likes' on facebook and increased traffic to the LRF website.

In the short term, the Lao-Isaan Super League, a cross-border competition which was held in 2010, represents the best opportunity for men's and women's club teams in Vientiane to compete in sustained 15s competition. The competition did not happen in 2011 and 2012 due to funding restrictions on the Lao and Thai sides, as well as challenges in agreeing on a schedule and format with Thai university teams. In 2013, the LRF will once again aim to work with the Thai Rugby Union and contacts in Isaan to get the competition back off of the ground.

2.7 Work with Cambodia Federation of Rugby to develop a fully-funded, sustainable Mekong Cup fifteens competition for men and women

In 2012, the Lao Men's National Team retained the Mekong Cup with a 58-7 win over Cambodia in the HSBC Asian 5 Nations tournament. Due to funding restrictions, it was not possible to organize a second match in the series; moreover, Cambodia was unable to field a women's national side to take part in the competition. The LRF is in discussions with Cambodia about organizing the Mekong Cup again in 2013, but due to funding restrictions for both unions, the match is unlikely to take place.

2.8 Seek partnerships with additional unions for annual test series

In March 2012, the LRF fielded a Lao Junior All-Stars team in a girls' 15s competition versus the Thailand and Hong Kong. These matches were not recognized as official tests. The LRF has contacted other including as UAE, Thailand, India, Malaysia and Cambodia regarding tests outside of ARFU-organized competitions, but to date these efforts have been unsuccessful.

2.9 Create, implement and resource a high-performance pathway for targeted players KPI: Creation of HP pathway

The Rugby Development Advisor and Men's National Team Coach was instrumental in bringing high performance techniques and standards to the Lao Men's National Team player pool in 2012. Her efforts will continue in 2013. The LRF has also secured the support of a volunteer from Japan Rugby Football Union and JICA who will be able to provide additional HP support to players.

Goal 4: Raise the profile of Lao Rugby at home and abroad

Build on the LRF's existing communication and marketing platforms to solidify the Lao Rugby brand identity and to raise the profile of Lao Rugby at home and abroad.

Objectives

4.1 Solidify the brand identity of the Lao Rugby to promote the LRF's core values and to position rugby as a Lao sport

KPI: Creation of LRF brand identity, style guide and semantics guide

The LRF Sponsorship and Marketing Coordinator has driven the branding of the LRF to the top of Asian rugby. The Sponsorship and Marketing Coordinator completed an LRF brand identity package, complete with templates and style guide. This is reflected across most of the LRF's documentation and all of its media.

4.2 Use rugby's inclusion in the 2016 Olympics and the 2019 Rugby World Cup in Japan to strengthen relations with the LNOC and grow the profile of the sport across the Lao PDR

The LRF organized four press conferences with the support of patron Dr. Somsanouk Mixay, Vice President of the Lao Journalists Association. This resulted in the publication of over a dozen articles on Lao Rugby. In addition, the LRF's Call Me Maybe and Gangnam Style music videos were aired on Lao television.

4.3 Maximize the value of the Lao Rugby brand, Champa Ban Rugby, Men's and Women's National teams, the Vientiane 10s, the domestic structure and LRF-hosted competitions to increase revenue

KPI: Amount of sponsorship secured for above items

The LRF generated over \$20,000 in cash and \$27,500 in in-kind support from sponsors for Champa Ban, Men's and Women's National Teams and the Lao Nagas tour to Hong Kong.

4.4 Put in place a comprehensive marketing and communications strategy which increases awareness and understanding of the sport and enhances coverage of LRF in the Lao PDR and across the region

KPI: Creation and implementation of comprehensive marketing strategy

KPI: Creation of Lao and English marketing materials

The LRF Sponsorship and Marketing Coordinator has continued to drive forward LRF marketing and communications, creating a strategy and numerous high quality, vibrant marketing and communications materials in Lao and English. The LRF has also been supported by a photographer, videographer and video-editing volunteer who will join the LRF as a volunteer Media and Communications Officer in February 2013.

4.5 Raise awareness of Lao Rugby across the region through participation in ARFU competitions (A5N, A7S, AW4N) and national and international multi-sport games (Lao National Games, Lao National Student Games, SEA Games, Asian Games)

KPI: Participation in ARFU competitions and national and international multi-sport games

In 2012, the LRF national teams in the Asian Women's 4 Nations, Asian Women's 5 Nations, the HSBC and Thailand 7s. The Silver Heritage Lao Nagas, a representative side made up of members from the Vientiane Wild Hogs and Vientiane Buffalos, generated significant visibility from their participation in the Kowloon RugbyFest, including feature articles in the South China Morning Post, Wall Street Journal - Southeast Asia Real Time blog and Hong Kong Magazine online. Lao filmmaker Xaisongkham Induangchanthy produced a documentary film about the Hong Kong tour, which was shown at a public launch and distributed to partners in Laos, Hong Kong and the Asian Rugby Football Union, and it will be shown on the opening night of the Vientianale Film Festival in February 2013.

4.6 Maintain positive image by creating and distributing high-quality media via social media and the internet

KPI: Website, facebook and youtube metrics



With 'Call Me Maybe' and 'Gangnam Style' music video covers, the LRF registered over 35,000 youtube views and drove significant traffic to the facebook page. The LRF registered over 500 new 'likes' in 2012.

4.7 Host high profile international events

KPI: Number of international rugby events hosted in the Lao PDR

The LRF hosted 2 international rugby events in 2012: the Vientiane International 10s and the Asian Girls Friendship Tournament with Hong Kong and Thailand.

4.8 Work to create a dedicated rugby facility in Vientiane Capital KPI: Building of rugby facility

Initial costings were drawn up for the construction of a rugby facility. The LRF will work with the Advisory Committee and Executive Board to push these efforts forward in 2013.

Goal 5: Strengthen Partnerships to Achieve Sustainability and Drive Growth

Strengthen relationships with partners in the Lao PDR, Asia and beyond so that the LRF achieves long-term sustainability and grows to provide playing and non-playing rugby participation opportunities to all in the Lao PDR.

Due to the efforts of LRF President Mr. Virayouth Rathikoun and aided by contacts of the Operations Advisor, the LRF was able to strengthen relations with the Director and Depty Director of the Elite Sports Department of the Ministry of Education and Sport. The LRF submitted an annual report and annual plan to the MoES and conducted multiple meetings with the MoES, which resulted in support in securing Chao Anouvong Stadium for the Vientiane International Rugby Championship. In 2013, the LRF will endeavour to work more closely with the Ministry and the Lao National Olympic Committee to secure Olympic Solidarity funding and to facilitate attendance at multi-sport games, including the Asian Youth Games (Nanjing, China, 2013), the Asian Games (Incheon, Korea, 2014) and SEA Games (Singapore, Singapore, 2015).

5.3 Build on strong foundation with ARFU to further develop the LRF's infrastructure, resources and processes and ensure consistent opportunities for quality competition KPI: Level of support and resources, financial and otherwise, secured from ARFU

The LRF received attendance grants for ARFU competitions, however no additional funding was available in the form of development grants. The LRF was able to secure additional support through ARFU networks and other unions, including but not limited to: kit donations from Hong Kong RFU and Japan RFU, volunteer support from HKRFU (short-term volunteer coach), volunteer support from Japan RFU (short-term volunteer coach in 2012, commitment to providing short-term volunteer coach in 2013 with support of JICA), access to Hong Kong 7s tickets for Silver Heritage Lao Nagas and a pilot partnership with Asian Rugby TV.

5.4 Collaborate with IRB representatives to achieve full membership in the IRB KPI: IRB Membership application status

The LRF's application for IRB Membership has not been submitted, as the LRF has not met the criterion of having 10 teams. The LRF Council Member for ARFU has submitted a formal request to ARFU's IRB representative to introduce the idea of modified membership criteria for Least Developed Countries (LDCs). This will be presented at the next IRB Council Meeting in May.

5.5 Partner with mass organisations and established institutions to offer sustainable rugby participation opportunities

In 2012, the LRF did not offer sustainable rugby participation opportunities in partnership with mass organisations and Lao institutions.

5.6 Cooperate with INGOs and embassies to support projects using rugby as a tool for development

KPI: Number of projects undertaken with INGOs and embassies

In 2012, the LRF launched a 2 year sport-for-development project with ChildFund Laos. The project aims to use rugby as a vehicle to teach healthy living and life skills to male and female children and youth across 12 villages in Nonghet District, Xieng Khouang province.
